A critical information literacy toolkit for Sustainability

Overview – three stages of this project

- Series of workshops around introducing sustainable research through a critical information literacy framework
- Reflection on this process
- Production of a critical information literacy toolkit for other librarians.
 This is the latter stage of the project and will partly fall after the PGCert deadline.

Rationale for project (the problem)

Library: Sustainability Community of Practice

- Tackles sustainable practice in the library spaces
- Hasn't yet embarked on the library's teaching provision and information literacy

UAL Museums and Galleries: Climate Emergency Working Group

- Collections focused (future collections strategies; any collecting at all?)
- Collecting student work
- Tackling knowledge around sustainability early on
- Inclusive and understanding of why people can't make sustainable choices.

Pedagogical theory and research (the solution)

- Make sustainability part of framework of critical information literacy activities in the Library
- Making activism part of learning. i.e. challenging positionality in relation to information; removing homogeneous rhetoric around Climate Change. Burns; Kolb; Appleton
- Co-learning
- Co-creating (searching, finding and sharing information)
- Taking this back to SusCop libraries are hierarchical places!

Workshops (active research)

To review the literature surrounding information literacy and teaching methodologies relating to information literacy in the arts, and criticality with a focus on sustainability (in HE; an arts context is an advantage).

I will base workshops on:

- searching databases that offer information on sustainable materials
- the extent of greenwashing in information resources (i.e. understanding the connection between the UN's social, economic and ecological pillars)
- the legacy of Climate Change in the literature. How are inequalities ignored or acknowledged.
- the appropriation of marketable sustainable alternatives from other people and cultures.
- How searching diverse information sources can offer different perspectives.

This will be a starting point only, discussions and feedback will shape the conversation and offer...
